## Dear Detective,

# Key Tasks (Prior to Opening the Confidential Envelope)

- 1. Create a Timeline: Construct a detailed timeline of events for everyone present at the exhibition on the day of the incident.
- 2. Examine Motives and Alibis: Scrutinise the motives and alibis of each individual involved, starting with close family relations and then expanding to others who may have had a vested interest.
- 3. Consider Additional Suspects: Identify any individuals who may have had reason to steal the diamond and/or murder Mr. Harris beyond his close network of family and friends.
- 4. Assess Suspect Credibility: Evaluate the veracity of each witness's statements and explore possible motives for deceit.
- 5. Prove Suspicion: Develop a clear line of reasoning to substantiate that Mr. Harris's death and the events preceding it were indeed suspicious.
